#### Elmer S. Gish Elementary (2000-2002)

As my first school, Gish was highly influential to beginning to understand what school was. Being all within 6 years of each other, and Gish covering K-9, I was able to start school with all of my siblings around. Beyond that, this school always carried an open vibe. My teachers were always very accepting and open to their students needs. This bedroom city of Edmonton (St. Albert) in general always felt like it had a welcome energy where people were maybe a little less well-off financially, but very at peace. I recall my fellow students all being very

entertaining in K-2. This is a good age for a lot to stay on track, obviously, but things definitely were easier here all around than in Edmonton itself in grades 2-9. I feel That the vibe that this school brought, the welcoming Classrooms, and assistance available are all building Blocks towards my teaching values today.

It's early, but this City reminds me a lot of what Kamloops Feels like.

Calgary would be before this, but has no influence on my Education (yet) as I was 0-3 years old.





Cold as advertised! This was not a welcome city to my history, yet important in a lesson of what I did not want to do as a teacher. Family remained the most important here, and that's first and foremost of what I have to emphasize here.

To this day, Gallery 7's head guy, and the producer are both close friends in the working relationship. Both have provided me recommendations for community and references into the teaching program.










